"new clients" average a request for monetary assistance at a level 17% higher than our average client in 2008. With this increased need and the 34% increase in the number of clients, we are facing a \$30,000 increase in client funding this year. Our only answer to this increased demand is to increase the number and level of grant requests and our fund raising efforts.

The number of clients coming in due to the loss of employment has never been higher. In an effort to assist with the job losses, we are partnering with the Pikes Peak Workforce Center (PPWFC). The PPWFC has a multitude of tools to assist in finding employment that include re-training and job search assistance.

With the adult job pool shrinking the outlook for summer youth employment looks very grim. The PPWFC offers help for the kids as well.

With all of this, we are forced to rely more heavily on the friends of HtN to ensure continued client services through these trying times. Be aware that many of our forms have been updated because of new documentation requirements . DSS, or the Department of Social Services, is now the Department of Human Services. Energy Outreach Colorado or EOC has new documentation requirements for the number of rooms in the client home whether or not it has been weatherized and income verification. Accordingly, our client intake documents have changed; notably the L1 form.
